Priority is given to diseases linked by common, preventable and lifestyle related risk factors (e.g. unhealthy diet, tobacco use), including oral health. High relative risk of oral disease relates to socio-cultural determinants such as poor living conditions; low education; lack of traditions, beliefs and culture in support of oral health.

What are the most frequent oral diseases? dental caries (cavities); periodontal (gum) disease; oral cancer; oral infectious diseases; trauma from injuries; and. hereditary lesions.

With appropriate diet and nutrition, primary prevention of many oral, dental and craniofacial diseases can be achieved. Lifestyle behaviour that affects general health such as tobacco use, excessive alcohol consumption and poor dietary choices affect oral and craniofacial health as well.

The World Health Assembly established a Resolution (WHA60.17) on Oral Health: Action plan for promotion and integrated disease prevention, which stresses the responsibility of countries in developing appropriate public health actions for oral disease prevention and health promotion. 23 Likewise, WHO pointed out the unique role of the research community 24 and oral health professionals 25 in building country capacity for oral health.

### WHO | What is the burden of oral disease?

One way to prevent cavities in young children is to improve pregnant women ' s oral health. Pregnancy may make women more prone to periodontal (gum) disease and cavities. Oral health may be considered an important part of prenatal care, given that poor oral health during pregnancy can lead to poor health outcomes for the mother and baby.

In such a time, oral health care providers and advocates must clearly communicate the importance of oral health to overall health, indicate the steps being taken to ensure patient and provider safety, and promote prevention and nonaerosolizing procedures . Emphasis is put on developing European policies on oral health promotion and oral disease prevention, including: building public health policies aiming for effective control of risks to oral health; particularly regarding the intake of sugars for adults and children, tobacco prevention and prevention of excessive consumption of alcohol; stimulating development and implementation of community-based projects for oral health, with a focus on disadvantaged and poor population groups;
